The CtCTC is ideal for gatherings of preachers (circuit meetings, pastors' conferences, staff meetings, etc.) who are interested in spurring one another on to be proactive in fighting the Enemy's lies concerning purity, shame, and God's ability to forgive struggling sinners.

In the following pages, you will discover a five-part training camp that includes both short videos and learning activities. Instructions for each activity are included and your facilitator will guide you through the videos.

Few things are as powerful as a clear message from God's timeless Word. We at Conquerors through Christ pray that the CtCTC equips you to bless God's people with the grace and truth that they need to honor God with their bodies in our challenging culture!

Note to Facilitators: Your job is to facilitate the larger group discussions and to guide the transitions from video segments to learning activities. For most groups, the entire CtCTC takes approximately six hours to cover. Therefore, consider if (1) a one day event, (2) two separate three-hour sessions, broken up between the Demonize and Evangelize sections, or (3) five 70-minute sessions, one session per major part, is best for your specific context. Finally, make sure to take adequate breaks of fifteen minutes between sessions to keep energy levels high and brains at full capacity.

ACTIVITY:

In groups of 3-4 people, share your experiences with preaching on pornography. Have you ever talked specifically about it? How did people react? If you could go back, what would you do differently?

ACTIVITY #1: VERBA-LIES

While it would not be wise for pastors to say something about pornography in every sermon, it is essential that they verbalize the issue in some sermons. After all, if pastors don't preach about pornography, the Devil still will. In groups of 3-4, read Ephesians 4:17-19, Paul's words to the Christians who lived in sex-saturated Ephesus. List at least six things that might happen if pastors don't verbalize the truth about sexuality, purity, and pornography. Finally, share your answers with the entire group.

Play Video #3: Why Preach?

While counseling sessions and Bible classes are important in the fight for purity, verbalizing the issue from the pulpit is essential.

ACTIVITY #2: LITTLE EARS AND OFFENDED ETHEL

Many preachers are concerned about the little ears who will overhear the "PG-13 preaching" on pornography. In addition, they fear offending those who might find the topic inappropriate for a worship service. Therefore, (1) personally think about the three statements below, (2) pair up with 1-2 others to share your answers, and (3) discuss your answers with the entire group.

- 1. Evaluate: It is better for a 6 year-old to first hear about porn from the Word than for a 10 year-old to first hear about porn from the world.
- 2. Evaluate: The taboo nature of sexuality in the pulpit is one of the main reasons why sexual sin is flourishing among Christians today.
- 3. Evaluate: A pastor who shares statistics about porn use among Christians will turn elderly and/or offended listeners into his allies.

Play Video #4: My First Porn

Since children are seeing graphic pornography at a shockingly early age, loving pastors preach proactively.

ACTIVITY #3: LET THE TEXT TALK

When is the right time to preach about pornography? How can a preacher make this potentially awkward topic as natural and biblically textual as possible? Thankfully, whether you follow the traditional readings of the church year (the pericope) or craft your own sermon series, there are ample opportunities to preach on pornography. Use the suggested readings below to discover how often the Scriptures allow textual preachers to address this issue. Work in groups of 3-4 people and, after four minutes of discussion, share your insights with the entire group.

The Porn Pericope: Themes like sexual immorality, lust, purity of heart, etc. appear in a whopping number of the weeks listed in the ILCW Scripture readings. Grab a Bible, skim the references below and connect each reading to our modern struggle with pornography.

A. Year A

- 1. Christmas Eve: Titus 2:11-14
- 2. Epiphany 6: 2 Samuel 11/1 Th. 4:1-12/Mt. 5:21-37

B. Year B

- 1. Good Friday: Hebrews 7:26-28
- 2. Pentecost 21: Hebrews 13:1-6


C. Year C

- 1. Pentecost 5: Genesis 39
- 2. Pentecost 23: 1 John 2:15-17

Play Video #5: 0 for 70

Even faithful preachers might forget to say something about porn in their preaching.



Closing Prayer: Dear Father, you have called me to courageously and faithfully shepherd your people. My heart's desire is to protect them from the Father of Lies, the Enemy who has twisted sex into a way to steal, kill, and destroy your blessings. Give me wisdom and boldness as I say what is true, beautiful, and life-giving in the midst of this confused and corrupt generation. Bless every soul in my church with ears to hear and understanding of my motives. So many of your sons and daughters are desperate for help, and I pray you would equip me to say exactly what their hearts need. I pray in Jesus' name, Amen.

Play Video #6: I'm Not Normal

Since feeling abnormal keeps Christians from confession, wise pastors seek to normalize, without excusing or minimizing, sexual sin.

Note: Pastors who have struggled with pornography should pray and seek wise counsel before deciding if/when/how much of their story to share publicly.

ACTIVITY #1: CRUNCH YOUR NUMBERS

Christian porn users feel abnormal until they know the numbers. Accurate statistics about porn read among Christians both encourages users to feel part of their church family and helps non-users realize how many of their brothers and sisters are facing temptation.

Use the following statistics from *The Porn Phenomenon*, a study of nearly 3,000 people's pornography use, and crunch the numbers for your local ministry. Finally, discuss the challenge question in groups of 3-4 people.

• 33% of Americans (13 and older) seek out porn at least once/month.

Challenge: What would be the most effective way to share these statistics to raise awareness and compassion at your church?

ACTIVITY #2: WATCH YOUR WORDING

One of the best ways to create a culture of confession is to watch your wording. Labels and pronouns have power to either encourage sexual sinners to come into the light or to shove them back into the darkness where sexual sins festers and thrives.

In groups of 3-4 people, evaluate the following snippets from Pastor Smith's sermon. Grade him (A, B, C, D, or F) on his ability to normalize the porn struggles among his people.

- A. "The world, sadly, has no respect for God's design for sexuality. The people of the world mock Jesus' view on marriage. They sext their significant others. They waste their nights pursuing porn online. Therefore, we must protect ourselves and our children from the corruption of the world."
- B. "Ryan and his wife were fighting . . . again. Being a man, he was more interested in intimacy than she was. Wired as a visual male, he faced daily temptation that she would never quite understand. When he turned to pornography, she exploded with confusion and anger. His friends sympathized. Her friends picked up stones."
- C. "Maria learned that marriage was not a quick fix for sexual temptation. Like so many of her brothers and sisters at church, she continued to struggle with lust even after her heartfelt vows. She loved her husband, loved her Savior even more, but part of her heart loved the escape that pornography provided."

Play Video #7: Audrey's Story

While Christian men may statistically struggle with porn more often than their sisters in Christ, compassionate pastors normalize the struggle for all people.

ACTIVITY #3: SCRIPT WITH STORIES

A powerful way to normalize this struggle and encourage people to reach out for help is to describe what will happen once they do. Telling stories gives people a mental script of the conversation that would happen when they step forward in honest confession.

In groups of 3-4, complete the following sermon illustration with the details that would encourage the porn users at your church to come forward and ask for help. Then, share your answers with the entire group.

"A few years ago, Mark was struggling with pornography. He was nervous to

talk to me because he assumed ______. That's why he

was surprised when I told him, '_____.' The Devil had made

him forget that Jesus (and Christians who have the heart of Christ) feels

Play Video #8: Safety First

Pastors have the privilege and challenge to create safe environments for every type of sinner that walks through their doors.

Closing Prayer: Dear Jesus, you came to rescue sinners from the darkness and shame of sin, and this sin is no exception. Please send the Holy Spirit to give me the right words to say as I preach so that your people who are losing the battle against temptation might find a community of accepting Christians and, most importantly, reminders of your never-failing love. Grace me with the message, the tone, and the non-verbals to draw sexual sinners into the light of honest confession that will enable me to speak a hopeful word to hurting hearts. In your name I pray, Amen.

Play Video #9: The Naked Truth

While pornography is packaged as exciting, alluring, and fun, it is actually an invention of those who hate God and his people.

ACTIVITY #1: PORN KILLS

In groups of 3-4, read the following passages and list the good gifts that Satan wants to put to death through sexual sin. After 4 minutes, compile your list with the other groups' lists.

- Romans 1:24-25—"Therefore God gave them over in the sinful desires of their hearts to sexual impurity for the degrading of their bodies with one another. They exchanged the truth about God for a lie, and worshiped and served created things rather than the Creator—who is forever praised. Amen."
- 1 Corinthians 6:18—"Flee from sexual immorality. All other sins a person commits are outside the body, but whoever sins sexually, sins against their own body."
- Matthew 18:6—"If anyone causes one of these little ones—those who believe in me—to stumble, it would be better for them to have a large millstone hung around their neck and to be drowned in the depths of the sea."
- Ephesians 5:11—"Have nothing to do with the fruitless deeds of darkness, but rather expose them."

• 1 Thessalonians 4:3-8—"It is God's will that you should be sanctified: that you should avoid sexual immorality; that each of you should learn to control your own body in a way that is holy and honorable, not in passionate lust like the pagans, who do not know God; and that in this matter no one should wrong or take advantage of a brother or sister. The Lord will punish all those who commit such sins, as we told you and warned you before. For God did not call us to be impure, but to live a holy life. Therefore, anyone who rejects this instruction does not reject a human being but God, the very God who gives you his Holy Spirit."

Play Video #10: The Demonically Trained Brain

Dopamine, Oxytocin, Vasopressin, and Epinephrine are the demons' tools for turning sinners into slaves.

ACTIVITY #2: PORN KILLS (PART II)

We often think of pornography's effect on our lives, our families, our bodies and our faith. But what about the lives, bodies, and faith of our families, our friends, and our culture? In small groups, discuss the negative impact porn use has on the following aspects of life:

- The way young people view sex
- The way women view their own bodies
- The expectations spouses bring to the marriage bed
- The limited time we have to pray, study, and serve
- The rampant sex trafficking industry

Play Video #11: Reframing Porn

Porn looks fun on camera, but outside the frame is a world of brokenness and misery.

ACTIVITY #3: "YOU SHALL NOT!" VS. "WHY NOT?"

In the 4th commandment, God explains why we should not dishonor our parents and others in authority, namely, to enjoy a long life on the earth. In the same way, wise preachers explain the "Why not?" behind God's "You Shall Not!"

In groups of 3-4, take these sermon snippets from good to great by adding a credible explanation to the preacher's prohibition. After you've completed the exercise, share your thoughts with another group.

- "In Matthew 5, Jesus forbids lust in the strongest of terms. The world tells us that pornography is a fun way to express our sexual freedom. But the Word himself tells us that pornography is a plague. Therefore, stay away from it!"
- "In 1 Corinthians 6, Paul commands us, 'Flee from sexual immorality.' Just four words with one big idea. Run. Don't ask questions. Don't stay and see what happens. Just flee."

Play Video #12: Recycling & Porn

Insightful preachers do not assume that church-going people agree that pornography is demonic.

Closing Prayer: Lord, have mercy on me, a sinner. In moments of temptation I have forgotten the damage that every impure click does to your world, your people, and my own soul. I praise you today not only for opening my eyes to the true nature of pornography but also for refusing to treat me as my sins deserve. Thank you for the amazing grace that forgives my sins and dares to call me worthy of the kingdom of God. Give me courage to tell your people how demonic pornography is while reminding them of your unfailing mercy. I need your help to do this, Lord, which is why I am praying in Jesus' name, Amen.

Normalize – Use stats/stories to make porn "normal" enough to confess.

Play Video #13: VNDS vs. VNDES

While many Christian resources verbalize, normalize, demonize, and strategize, very few evangelize those struggling with sexual sin.

ACTIVITY #1: JESUS' XXX FAMILY TREE

Ponder the names listed in Jesus' family tree in Matthew 1 (below). How many sexual sinners do you see? What might be powerful about pointing out names like Tamar (a female prostitute), Ruth (a pagan woman), and Mary (a Jewish virgin) in your preaching? How could connecting this chapter to Hebrews 2:11 be a powerful way to evangelize those struggling with porn in your church? Discuss your findings in groups of 3-4.

Matthew 1—"This is the genealogy of Jesus the Messiah the son of David, the son of Abraham: Abraham was the father of Isaac, Isaac the father of Jacob, Jacob the father of Judah and his brothers, Judah the father of Perez and Zerah, whose mother was Tamar, Perez the father of Hezron, Hezron the father of Ram, Ram the father of Amminadab, Amminadab the father of Nahshon, Nahshon the father of Salmon, Salmon the father of Boaz, whose mother was Rahab, Boaz the father of Obed, whose mother was Ruth, Obed the father of Jesse, and Jesse the father of King David. David was the father of Solomon, whose mother had been Uriah's wife, Solomon the father of Rehoboam, Rehoboam the father of Abijah, Abijah the father of Asa, Asa the father of Jehoshaphat, Jehoshaphat the father of Jehoram, Jehoram the father of Hezekiah, Hezekiah the father of Manasseh, Manasseh the father of Amon, Amon the father of Josiah, and Josiah the father of Jeconiah and his brothers at the time of the exile to Babylon. After the exile to Babylon: Jeconiah was the father of Shealtiel, Shealtiel the father of Zerubbabel, Zerubbabel the father of Abihud, Abihud the father of Eliakim, Eliakim the father of Azor, Azor the father of Zadok, Zadok the father of Akim, Akim the father of Elihud, Elihud the father of Eleazar, Eleazar the father of Matthan, Matthan the father of Jacob, and Jacob the father of Joseph, the husband of Mary, and Mary was the mother of Jesus who is called the Messiah."

Hebrews 2:11—"Both the one who makes people holy and those who are made holy are of the same family. So Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters."

Play Video #14: Thank God for Genealogies!

The Scriptures are filled with sexual sinners that God was not ashamed to call his beloved sons and daughters.

ACTIVITY #2: EVALUATING EVANGELISTIC PREACHING

Read the sermon snippets below and rank the most powerful paragraphs from the perspective of a sexual sinner. Then explain your answers in groups of 3-4 people.

- "God so loved the world. Did you hear that? The world! The world includes you and him and her and us all. The world includes worriers and liars and those who try to get their way. The world includes every kind of sinner you can think of. If you're in this world, congratulations. God loves you."
- "For being sexually sinless, Jesus sure had a thing for sexual sinners. Abraham slept with his maidservant. Judah had a secret prostitute habit. David was a peeping Tom and an adulterer. Yet Jesus was related to them. Jesus redeemed them. Jesus rescued them from the guilt, shame, and eternal consequence of their sexual sin. And—praise be to God!—Jesus is the same yesterday, today, and forever. That means if you have acted like those men, Jesus still loves you."

- "Brothers and sisters, sexual sin is killing us. Jesus did not die on the cross so we could go back and sit in the mud puddles of porn. He died to make us clean. So, live a life worthy of the calling you have received. Fight the temptation. Flee from pornography. Honor God with your body."
- "Did you know most Ephesians grew up worshiping a pornographic goddess named Artemis? Yet, because they were in Christ, Paul calls them saints, holy, blameless, members of God's household. Many of us have had a less than pure past as well. But what Jesus did for the Ephesians, he did for you. No matter what you've done or seen or hidden, in Christ you are a saint! You are holy! You are blameless! You are one of God's beloved kids, a member of his household!"

ACTIVITY #3: DIY PREACHING

Choose one of the following passages and write a paragraph that would speak grace to someone who had given into lust before the church service. Then, share your paragraph with a fellow preacher.

> **Closing Prayer:** Jesus, you loved the Woman at the Well, the Prodigal Son, and the prostitutes who confessed their sexual sins to you. You love me and my entire congregation too. I praise you for always letting grace get the last word. I thank you that whenever our lusts increase, your grace increases even more. Since you are the King of mercy, I ask that you would help me to specialize in sharing your mercy every Sunday. Give me skill to apply it specifically so that every last soul that hears my next sermon is moved to praise you at my side. In your name, Amen.

ACTIVITY #1: RUN WITH THEM

In groups of 3-4 people, list at least five reasons why you believe this is true. Finally, brainstorm ways to facilitate/encourage accountability through your preaching.

ACTIVITY #3: RUN FROM IT

Review the following tips from anti-porn authors. Which do you feel would be the most helpful to mention in your sermons? Which would be the least? Explain your answers in groups of 3-4 people.


- Bounce the Eyes—Train your eyes to immediately bounce from a potential object of lust until your natural instinct is to visually flee from temptation. As Job said, "I made a covenant with my eyes not to look lustfully at a young woman."
- Monitor your H.E.A.L.T.H.—Be aware of/minimize moments when you are Hungry (missing meals), lack Energy (missing workouts), feel Angry (stuffing emotions), feel Lonely (disconnected from friends and family), feel Tired (missing sleep), and/or have an empty Heart (missing the Word/prayer).
- Filter the Foul—Use an internet filter (like Covenant Eyes or X3 Watch) to make pornographic content more difficult to access, allowing time for the Holy Spirit to remind you who you are and what porn will do to you.
- Dimmer Switch—Recognize that rewiring and rebooting your pornaddicted brain takes time. For most Christians, fleeing from sexual temptation is a dimmer switch and not a light switch, more of a process than a one-time decision. Therefore, rejoice in increasing victories and beware of expecting perfection.

- CtC Newsletter: An encouraging word that can easily be shared on your church's social media channels and/or website.
- **Recommended Counselors:** CtC approved professional counselors who serve locally and/or via internet services.



CONCLUSION: VNDES!

Verbalize – Say something about pornography when you preach.
Normalize – Use stats/stories to make porn "normal" enough to confess.
Demonize – Explain why porn is a demonic attempt to kill God's good gifts.
Evangelize – Share the good news of Jesus' forgiveness with porn users.
Strategize – Give the saved specific tips on fighting sexual sin.

APPENDIX 1 — THE PORN PERICOPE

The opportunity to "verbalize" pornography is not limited to preachers who craft their own sermon series. The pericope, or selected readings of the church year, is filled with connections to sexuality, purity, adultery, passions, pleasures, clean hands, and purifying grace. Review the readings below, taken from the supplemental lectionary of the Christian Worship Supplement, as you seek to preach textually on the topic of pornography.

The goal of this appendix is not to squeeze pornography into any and every reference to sin, godlessness, etc. Although applications to sexual sin could easily be made in every reading from Corinthians or Ephesians or Hosea (given the cultural context of those books), the point of the following pages is to open preachers' eyes to the frequency that the lectionary specifically addresses areas of sexuality. This enables preachers to speak naturally and textually to the issues of sexual sin that are affecting their congregations.

Note: Certain Sundays, such as Epiphany 6 (Year A) or Pentecost 4 (Year C), have a strong emphasis on sexuality throughout the readings and provide a great opportunity to make God's love for sexual sinners a theme for the service. Consider leveraging this opportunity to help God's people with other resources from your church and/or materials from Conquerors through Christ.
